### FOREWORD -

In 1964, Major Ozell Dean attended a White House luncheon convened by the then First Lady, Lady Bird Johnson. She did not know at that time that she was about to make history. She did not know at that time that because of her vision and foresight that she would be responsible for enhancing and impacting the lives of so many through the vehicle that she and her seven fellow sisters founded - Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc. (a/k/a TLOD).

For 55 years, TLOD has made great strides in the communities that she serves through the wisdom, vision and creativity of 13 administrations. These administrations were helmed by enthusiastic, excited, energetic, vivacious, knowledgeable, committed and resourceful women who built on the foundation laid by the Founders and stood on the shoulders of each one before them. They all had one thing in common - Serving Youth & Adults:

#### #1 FRANCHELL BOSWELL\* - (1964-1971) – FIRST NATIONAL PRESIDENT

As the first National President, Lady Boswell's focus was on incorporation, growing the membership by chartering 14 chapters and adopting the first Constitution. The first Editor-of-the-Crown was appointed. Hers were the **"developmental years"** when the founders concentrated on "spreading the word" and building the foundation.

#### #2 LAVERNE MADLOCK\* - (1971 - 1975) - SECOND NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Madlock's theme was **"Shapers of Change – a Continuing Commitment."** During this administration, the National Program Thrusts: Top Teens of America, Senior Citizens, Community Beautification, and Status of Women, were created and TLOD began support of National Projects UNCF and NAACP. The organization continued to grow, refine and shape its legal structure through its governance guidelines. Eleven (11) additional chapters were chartered and the National Hymn was written by Lady Fredda Witherspoon. The Honorable Congresswoman Barbara Jordan became TLOD's first Honorary Member.

#### #3 FAYE B. BRYANT\* - (1975 - 1979) - THIRD NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Bryant's administration theme was **"TLOD: Shapers of Change – A Continuing Commitment".** Under her leadership, the National Membership Program was initiated, the first Top Teens National Scholarships were presented, and NCNW was added as an affiliate of TLOD. Nine chapters were chartered.

#### #4 VIVIAN CRAWLEY\* - (1979 - 1983) – FOURTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

The Crawley years were devoted to **"TLOD: Shapers of Change – A Continuing Commitment."** Civil Rights Activist Rosa Parks became the second Honorary Member. Fourteen (14) chapters were chartered.

#### #5 BOBBIE MOOREHEAD - (1983 - 1987) – FIFTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Moorehead's administration was known as **"The Networking Years – Networking to Serve Youth and Adults."** Thirty-four (34) chapters were chartered including the first International Chapter – Montego Bay. Five Honorary members were inducted: Daisy Bates, Ophelia Devore Mitchell, Dorothy Height, Jacquel-ine Vaughn and Deborah Cannon-Wolfe. TLOD was invited to the White House and showcased in Jet Magazine. TLOD took up the causes of Assault on Illiteracy (AOIP), National Black Leadership Roundtable, The National Foundation – March of Dimes and the National Urban League.

#### #6 JACQUELYN HEATH PARKER - (1987 - 1991) - SIXTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Parker's theme was "Orbiting Towards the 21st Century." This administration developed the Program of Work, the ritualistic ceremony for Founders' Day, gained corporate sponsors - Anheuser Bush, Nabisco, Coors, the Regal Foundation and Pepsi, areas and chapters became tax exempt units under National Office,

the TTA pledge of \$25,000 to UNCF was realized, the first scholarship from the Franchell Boswell Endowment Fund was granted, the building fund was established, nineteen (19) chapters were chartered and Honorary Member, Mrs. Margaret Adams, was inducted.

#### #7 MARIE STELLOS\* - (1991 - 1995) – SEVENTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Stellos' theme was **"Programming our Thrusts for Greater Advancement in the 21st Century."** These were the programming years. The first business office was established, marketing brochures were created, TLOD prayer was approved, sixteen (16) chapters were chartered, membership grew to 3,300, all governance documents were revised, an attorney and a tax accountant were hired, and the first TLOD choir was formed.

#### #8 DOROTHY ALLEN CHIMNEY - (1995 - 1999) – EIGHTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Chimney's theme was "Serving with Unity of Purpose." This administration focused on unity and the mentoring of our youth. Program directives were initiated, the first leadership academy was held in Greensboro, N.C., the fifth program thrust – community partnerships was initiated, the collaboration with March of Dimes "Healthy Choices: Your Future and You" began, the National Headquarters Campaign was initiated, "me and My Mentor" was initiated, the crown and orchid were trademarked, Honorary members Dr. Gloria Scott and the Honorable Maxine Waters were inducted, and eight chapters were chartered.

#### #9 VIVIEN COE RICHARD\* - (1999 - 2003) - NINTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Richard's theme was **"Continuity of Total Quality Programming: TLOD 2000 . . . Soaring to New Heights of Service."** This administration developed the Program Resource Manual, established the first TLOD website, initiated a TTA Technical Scholarship, established the first National TTA Leadership Academy, chartered four chapters, and inducted Honorary Members Anita Bunkley and Jane E. Smith.

#### #10 PEGGY LEWIS LECOMPTE - (2003 - 2007) - 10TH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady LeCompte's theme was **"Mobilizing Youth and Adults to Provide Global Service and 21st Century Leadership."** This administration developed the signature program for Top Teens of America – M.O.M.E.N.T.U.M., initiated Boys and Girls Booked on Barbershops, the 140 Club, placed an historic marker in Tyler, TX, added Sickle Cell Disease Awareness as a Project, held a leadership Summit in St. Louis, MO, solicited funds for Hurricane Katrina, established official headquarters in Houston, TX, hired the first Executive Director, chartered fourteen (14) chapters, and inducted Honorary Members Frankie Muse Freeman, Charlotte Maull, Eunice Dudley, and Hazel Brown.

#### #11 LADY JACKIE POPE - (2007 - 2011) – ELEVENTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Pope's theme was **"Empowering Youth and Adults to Provide Exemplary Service with Passion and Purpose."** This administration developed a relationship with Rice University to host the TTA Leadership Academy for three years, raised outside funding for National programs, developed the first Strategic Plan, do-nated \$8,500 to the MLK Memorial, instituted National Day of Service, supported Desks and Pencils for South Africa Project, hosted TLOD sponsored event in Washington D.C. for the inauguration of President Barack Obama, initiated a program to restore and preserve African American cemeteries, and chartered eleven (11) chapters.

#### #12 LADY AUDRIE L. LAWTON - (2011 - 2015) - TWELFTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Lawton's theme was **"TLOD: Impacting our Future Through Positive Interventions in the Lives of our Youth, our Community, and our Legacy with Effective Volunteerism."** This administration's focus was on Top Teens and programs versus activities. Chapters captured reporting in a chapter report book, a STEM Program for 9th grade girls was initiated, pilot programs with Keep America Beautiful and ATEAAM/ TLOD Teens to Men were initiated, a partnership with Sisters Network was formed, online registration and other technology was utilized, additional scholarships were awarded, dues were increased to support technology and to fund the TTA Leadership Academy, chartered 6 chapters, and inducted Honorary Members, Dr. Barbara Shaw, Dr. Julianne Malveaux, and Yolanda Moore.

#### #13 LADY DREMA LEE WOLDMAN - (2015 - 2019) - THIRTEENTH NATIONAL PRESIDENT

Lady Woldman's theme was "Investing in V.A.L.U.E.S. that Support, Enhance, and Sustain." The acronym "Values" represented Volunteerism, Advocacy, Leadership, Unity, Empowerment and Social Responsibility. This administration focused on "investing" in our communities as well as the membership with relevant programming, awareness and/or training. The TTA curriculum was enhanced to include a bullying initiative, spelling bees, debate team, the TTA St. Jude Walk, and Blessings in a Backpack. Partnerships were formed with the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child, Health & Human Development (NICHD), AARP, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, The Balm in Gilead and the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America. Diabetes, Clinical Trials and health disparities in African Americans were front and center. STEM became STEAM and an Arts component was added to the TTA Leadership Academy. The first academy took place at NASA and the second was an HBCU bus tour to eight STEAM colleges and universities. TLOD's technology was greatly enhanced with a membership management database, WHOVA app, all forms of social media, webinars, etc. More focus was given to leadership development through institutes, clinics and workshops, standardized the TTA Code of Ethics and developed a Code of Conduct. Moved into new headquarters, chartered seventeen (17) chapters, and inducted honorary members Myrlie Evers-Williams, Dr. Pernessa Seele, Dr. Glenda Baskin Glover, and Dr. Juanita Sims Doty. This administration received over \$175,000 in grants and a \$500,000 pledge over a ten year period to be awarded to students who major in the Fine Arts.

As you can see, TLOD has a rich history of providing service, investing in the communities that we serve, and making a difference in the lives that we touch. Such phenomenal service can only be implemented through a network of dedicated and committed membership - a strong membership of caring ladies who were not sisters at birth, but sisters in service who came together to make this world a better place. Thank you Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc. for your sisterly and dedicated service for the past 55 years. Be blessed and continue to be a blessing to others!

Cash, Memphis, Tennessee; Major Ozelle Dean, Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Willie Lee Glass, Tyler, Texas; Mrs. LaVerne Madlock, Tyler, Texas; Mrs. Ruth Payne, Navasota, Texas and Mrs. Georgia Bell Prestwood, Dallas, Texas.

- A special committee was appointed (Leadership Development and Succession Planning) and in-depth Leadership training was held at every Syn-Lod and P-Top providing Clinics, Institutes, and "This Is How We Do It" Workshops to ensure that our members were well informed and knowledgeable;
- The website and Facebook page was enhanced, a membership management database was launched, Instagram, Google, Youtube, webinars, Go-to-meeting, and skype were utilized;
- Area Directors reached out to chapters at risk and provided assistance and guidance as they guided them to compliance and/or brought them back into the fold;
- A Membership manual was put in place, membership retention initiatives with incentives were launched, the National President sent a letter to all inactive ladies and reactivated over 100 members, 17 chapters were chartered, membership was increased by more than 20%;
- All Areas made an effort to ensure that all initiatives and best practices were implemented the same across TLOD. Bylaws were reviewed to weed out discrepancies and to conform with National; and

Finally, you responded to my request that you remember the vows that you took when you stated "I endorse the statement and purposes . . .VERY BEST of my ability." We did a lot of work during these past four years and it would have been for naught and without little progress if it had not been for the **SIX** hardworking and determined Areas in Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc. 

inevitability and providing community awareness as well was appealing. TLOD took on caregiving as a cause.

Our partnership was a limited partnership from 2015-2019. During those four years, we provided the following services in conjunction with AARP:

- National President was the moderator for a "Because We Care" panel with the Black Women's Agenda (BWA) in Chicago, IL in 2015;
- At each National Conference, AARP provided workshops to the membership and maintained Exhibit booths;
- In 2016, at the Parliamen-Top in Glenview, IL, all partnerships were showcased and a Caregiving panel was presented. Edna Kane-Williams, Vice President, AARP Multicultural Markets and Engagement, was a part of the panel. Ms. Williams was caring for her 92 year old mother and spoke from first-hand experience. The panel was moderated by another of our partners, (Lady) Dr. Pernessa Seele, CEO and Founder of the Balm In Gilead, Inc.
- At that same conference, AARP provided funding for the luncheon;
- In 2016, TLOD sponsored an HBCU Gala in Houston, TX with the proceeds going to scholarships for Top Teens of America. Outstanding HBCU graduates were recognized. AARP provided Regina Belle as the enter-tainment which was a \$15,000 in-kind donation. Over \$25,000 was raised for TTA Scholarships.
- At the 2017 Syn-Lod in St. Louis, AARP provided Kim Coles actress, comedienne and spokesperson as a featured Caregiving speaker. Ms. Coles had photo ops with the Top Teens and provided a delightful and informative workshop/presentation to the Ladies and Lords followed by Q&A and sharing of caregiving testimonies. Her appearance was a \$15,000 in-kind donation;
- AARP provided funding for the President's luncheon;
- At TLOD's various area conferences and chapter events, AARP and caregiving were always highlighted and given attention. The local AARP offices were very generous in their support of our advocacy and provided us with materials to give out to our members and the communities we serve. In addition, they manned AARP tables and provided workshops locally and nationally;
- TLOD also partnered with Black Women's Agenda throughout the country to support and be a part of their "Because We Care" Agenda with AARP. Chapters in Areas I and IV participated in these activities.
- During the partnership, AARP provided more than \$60,000 to TLOD in cash and services-in-kind.

During this administration, thousands of Top Ladies, Lords, Teens and members of our communities were informed and empowered through the numerous workshops, presentations, featured speakers and panelists provided in the quest to prepare the masses with much needed information to navigate the onset of unexpected illnesses and other changes of normal daily living. We are very proud of the partnership that we shared with AARP and will continue to spread the word about caregiving. We thank AARP for their support.

In October 2014 at the 50th Anniversary, the 12th National President, Lady Audrie L. Lawton, introduced Dr. Juanita Sims Doty and Dr. Myrlie Evers as they presented a pilot program called the A-TEAAM (Ambassadors of the Evers Academy for African-American Males) - an initiative that pairs young African American males with leading role models in the community. It initially was a pilot program, but was continued by the 13th National President, Lady Drema Lee Woldman, during her administration. The A-TEAAM has organized teams of young African American males (called Ambassadors) to participate in a mentoring initiative in partnership with the Juanita Sims Doty Foundation and the Medgar and Myrlie Evans Foundation. TLOD, through his initiative, has sponsored teams in Cincinnati, OH; Houston, TX; E. St. Louis, IL; San Antonio Metro, TX; 2 chapters in Chicago, IL including the North Cluster which is comprised of 9 chapters; River City (San Antonio), TX; Raleigh, NC; Inglewood, CA; Sugar Valley, TX; and Las Vegas, NV. The TLOD Chapters are joined by chapters in Mississippi, Oregon, and Kentucky. A Chapter in Atlanta is on the horizon.

The A-TEAAM-TLOD initiative has included mentors from all walks of life: politicians, sororities and fraternities, policemen, ministers, corporate leaders. More than 600 youth have experienced months of workshops and experiences in mentoring workshops, i.e., Leadership, Community and Civic Engagement, Courage, Integrity, Perseverance, Racial Healing, Racial Equality (Justice and Respect), Responsibility, Teamwork, Anti-Bullying, Career – Purpose and Initiative, Health, Etiquette and Creativity. This consistent and defined mentoring program has produced acknowledged results. The following data has been documented since the program's inception: More than 85% showed an increase in their attitude, behavior, self-esteem, and understanding of Racial Equality. More than 70% showed changes in their behavior in the area of initiative; more than 90% indicated additional knowledge about their culture; more than 60% showed an increase in school attendance.

In honor of its 5<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, the A-TEAAM National Youth Leadership Summit was held in Jackson, MS on June 8-10, 2018. The TLOD ATEAAM and other Ambassadors (more than 300) engaged in youth-led sessions, celebrated the life and legacy of Medgar Evers, commemorated the 55<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of his assassination and unveiled the 2<sup>nd</sup> edition of **I! CAN Imagine: Voices of A-TEAAM Young Authors.** In this 2<sup>nd</sup> edition, more than 150 Ambassadors, of which more than 60 were A-TEAAM-TLOD Ambassadors, penned essays and poems about lessons learned from their experiences in the program. The central and most meaningful activities during this program were the sessions and time spent mentoring the Ambassadors. The results demonstrate that our young African American men were inspired and are inspired by the A –TEAAM-TLOD Movement and that TLOD, Inc. is invested in providing a better future for our youth by promoting, saving, transforming, empowering and endowing them with a stronger foundation, as well as providing a village of mentors that volunteer to enhance their quality of life by precept and example. Thanks to Dr. Juanita Sims Doty, Dr. Karla McCullough, and Dr. Myrlie Evers for bringing this well thought out program to Top Ladies of Distinction, and for providing the training necessary to execute a program of this magnitude. Because of their foresight and vision, hundreds of young African American men who do not have a father presence in their home now have a male presence in their lives. Dr. Juanita Sims Doty and Dr. Myrlie Evers are now Honorary Members of TLOD, Inc.



One of the issues that the 2015-2019 Administration focused on was health disparities in African American communities. TLOD wanted a forum to address disease, cancers, and other health related issues that were pertinent to our community, such as clinical trials, caregiving, research, etc. Thus the partnership with the Balm in Gilead, Inc. was born.

The mission of **The Balm In Gilead** is to prevent diseases and improve the health status of people of African Descent by supporting faith institutions in areas of program design, implementation, and evaluation to strengthen their capacity to programmatically eliminate health disparities.

Annually, the Balm in Gilead organizes and sponsors a Healthy Churches 2020 Conference. The Healthy Churches 2020 Conference provides pastors, ministers, congregational health directors, coordinators, nurses, and members with tools and resources in areas of disease state awareness, management, and prevention needed to establish and strengthen the capacity of Health Ministries. The Healthy Churches 2020 National Conference is the leading training conference for establishing and sustaining Health Ministries for congregations serving African Americans and for increasing an understanding of concepts and models of disease management to improve the quality of life for African-Americans with chronic health conditions. Conference topics include, but are not limited to: diabetes, obesity, heart disease, arthritis, hepatitis, Alzheimer's, cancer, HIV, precision medicine, and clinical studies. Healthy Churches 2020 National Conference is committed to helping congregational-based health ministries to improve the health and healthcare outcomes of individuals and surrounding communities they serve.

Dr. Pernessa C. Seele, Founder and CEO of the Balm In Gilead, Inc. presented relevant and useful information at TLOD Area and National conferences, participated in panels, and we, in turn, attended Healthy Churches 2020 Conferences, manned TLOD booths, recruited new members and participated in the programming. At these conferences, the participants are provided with a wealth of information aimed at educating the communities and the churches to advocate for health concerns. Bishops, Reverends, Pastors and other clergy, many of them well-known, presented workshops. Medical professionals provided necessary information about disease, clinical trials, caregiving, etc. in a format that was relevant and understandable to all. There were many opportunities for TLOD, Inc. to be involved, and we received a wealth of information to use in our pursuit of awareness for obesity, diabetes, mental health, cancer, high blood pressure and strokes.

In addition, musicians, choirs, and authors were in attendance for our enjoyment. One of the highlights was B. Smith and her husband promoting his book regarding his care for her during her bout with Alzheimers. Much was brought to life with real life depictions of the impact that disease has on families and relationships. Ben Vereen advocated for Diabetes. Other celebrities were on the programs as well as many vendors: American Heart Association, American Diabetes Association, Alzheimers, Breast Cancer, Mental Illness/Depression, etc. Whatever the health disparity, the Balm in Gilead has it covered.

Dr. Pernessa Seele, CEO and Founder, became an Honorary Member of Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc. in June, 2015 and Dr. Barbara Shaw, Honorary Member, is the Chairman of the Board of the Balm in Gilead, Inc.



Keep America Beautiful (KAB) is a nonprofit organization founded in 1953. It is the largest community improvement organization in the <u>United States</u>, with more than 600 state and community-based affiliate organizations and more than 1,000 partner organizations. KAB aims to end littering, to improve recycling, and to beautify American communities as it inspires and educates people to take action every day to improve and beautify their community environment.

TLOD's Community Beautification (CB) thrust and KAB's goals and objectives basically mirror each other. So, it was with great pleasure that an MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) was signed between KAB and TLOD formalizing our commitment to keeping our communities, neighborhoods, and country beautiful. Below is a timeline of our partnership with KAB:

- Syn-Lod 2013, San Antonio, Texas TLOD formed a trial partnership with Keep Texas Beautiful.
- 2013 Partnerships encouraged between TLOD local chapters and KAB Affiliates.
- 2014 100 % TLOD Chapter participation with the Great American Cleanup Campaign.
- 2015 2016 All Chapters encouraged to join KAB Affiliates. Reporting 100% Chapter participation.
- 2015 National CB Chair joined Senior VP for KAB Recycling Program at a Recycling Center.
- 2016 P-Top Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) confirmed between TLOD and KAB. First KAB Representative attended and briefed the KAB Agenda, and our first CB walk was conducted.
- 2016 KAB invited all TLOD Chapters to register with their Re-Trac Program a reporting tool used to manage, measure and share recycling information.
- 2016 First Top Teen selected from Will County Black Diamond Chapter, Chicago, Illinois, Area III, to serve on the KAB's National Youth Advisory Board.
- 2017 Second Top Teen selected to serve on the KAB's National Youth Advisory Board, Lincoln Park Chicago Chapter, Chicago, Illinois Area III.
- 2017 Area II Leadership Conference Sunday Breakfast- showcased local KAB Affiliate Partnership through "A Celebration of Community Beautification" Breakfast.
- 2017 Syn-Lod Second CB walk was conducted. Representatives from KAB St. Louis were in attendance for the walk and presented workshops. In addition, TLOD was presented with a plaque for their service. A Teen from Area III won the video contest.
- 2015-2019 continued to partner in recycling, litter prevention, green living, beautification and waste reduction. KAB presented at the majority of our conferences, local and National.
- 2019 Syn-Lod Atlanta Top Teens of America along with the ladies cleaned up the streets surrounding the Sheraton Atlanta during the conference. KAB Atlanta provided the vests, bags and other items needed to complete the task. Top Teens were presented with plaques.
- CB Chair and National 1st VP attended the KAB conference and made a presentation.

Enhancing and maintaining the communities in which we live, work, and recreate is the primary focus of the National Community Beautification Thrust, and we were able to meet all of our goals with the assistance of KAB.

We thank them for their support.



March of Dimes improves the health of mothers and babies through five programming areas: medical research, education of pregnant women, community programs, government advocacy, and support of pregnant women and mothers. The organization provides women and families with educational resources on baby health, pregnancy, preconception and new motherhood, as well as supplying information and support to families in the NICU who are affected by prematurity, birth defects, or other infant health problems.

The organization began in 1938 as the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. In 1976 it became known as the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation. In 2007, the formal name became the March of Dimes Foundation. Top Ladies has partnered with MOD since 1985 when Top Teens of America pledged \$25,000, the first Teen African American Group to do so, and met that pledge.

- Celebrated Prematurity Awareness Month and World Prematurity Awareness Day (November 17<sup>th</sup>) each year in order to raise awareness of the costly and serious problem of premature birth, the #1 killer of babies in our country. Top Ladies and Teens shared baby photos and dressed in purple to support the initiative.
- Members joined the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute as Peer Reviewers.
- Top Teens from several chapters were selected to serve as members of the Student Leadership Corps and the Youth Advisory Council.
- Developed the annual National Campaign for TLOD/TTA to participate in the MOD Prematurity Awareness month.
- Assisted chapters with coordinating or partnering with other organizations to have Healthy Choices Conferences.
- Conducted webinars and conference calls with Top Teens Advisors and March of Dimes Coordinators.
- Assisted chapters with creating fundraising pages.
- Monitored donations collected for March of Dimes.
- Presented March of Dimes Initiative during Advisors Institute during Parliamen-Top and Syn-Lod.
- Served as part of the test group to select the new March of Dimes logo.
- Attended all National Service Partner conference calls and webinars.
- Raised funds through Jail & Bail.
- Volunteered for the March of Dimes Fashion Show (2016, 2017, 2018 & 2019) in Houston, Texas.

TLOD remains proud to be partners with MOD and with our commitment and dedication, we can help lead the fight for the health of all moms and babies.



The mission of the *Eunice Kennedy Shriver* National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) is to ensure that every person is born healthy and wanted, that women suffer no harmful effects from the reproductive process, that all children have the chance to fulfill their potential to live healthy and productive lives free from disease or disability, and to ensure the health, productivity, independence, and well-being of all people through optimal rehabilitation.

One of the programs that was brought to TLOD, which was very timely and necessary, was the "Bullying: Be More Than a Bystander." This program was perfect for TLOD as TTA has over 4,000 youth. Bullying is a problem for youth throughout the nation. Students are bullied on some level on a daily basis. Sometimes they tell their parents or teachers and sometimes they don't because they are afraid. More often than not, when they tell their parents or teachers, the parent or teacher does not understand, and do not know how to handle the situation. Unfortunately, if not addressed, bullying can be taken to the extreme and end in tragedy such as homicide or suicide. We did not want that to happen to any of our youth; therefore, we embraced the Bullying platform. Through this program, parents, teachers and youth are taught how to recognize the signs of bullying and how to handle them.

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school-aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time. Both students who are bullied and who bully others may have serious, lasting problems. Nationwide, 28% of students in grades 6 to 12 experiences bullying. Approximately 30% of young people admit to bullying others. Most bullying happens in middle school. The most common types are verbal and social bullying. Bullying is not usually a simple interaction between a student who bullies and a student who is bullied. Instead, it often involves groups of students who support each other in bullying other students.

The program focused on the prevention of bullying and cyberbullying. It was presented by Dr. Triesta Fowler, Medical Officer, NICHD, National Institutes of Health, at the 2016 Parliamen-Top in Glenview, IL. The program was developed as a one day initiative, but we felt that it would carry more weight if it was broken down in modules and presented at the Teens Chapter Meetings. For the next three years, presentations were made at the Teens Chapter meetings starting annually in January with a pre-test, the modules were presented February through May, and a post-test conducted in June. Parents, outside presenters, ladies and the Teens themselves were involved in the interactive presentations. It was an eye opener to many because they were not aware of what was going on with the youth/student/child.

The takeaways were: Be a friend; Tell a trusted adult; Help the person get away from the situation; Don't give bullying an audience; Set a good example; Do not bully others; Protect yourself and others from cyberbullying, and Know when to get help.

This initiative was a welcome addition to the TTA curriculum and we thank the *Eunice Kennedy Shriver* National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD), Dr. Triesta Fowler, and Dr. Juanita Sims Doty for introducing this program to Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc.



**St. Jude Children's Research Hospital**, founded in 1962 by the iconic entertainer, Dany Thomas, is a pediatric treatment and research facility focused on children's catastrophic diseases, particularly leukemia and other cancers. The hospital costs about \$2.8 million a day to run, and there is no cost to the patient to be treated. It is located in Memphis, Tennessee, and is designated as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit medical facility.

The "Investing" Administration took on St. Jude as a cause because of the thousands of children that the hospital has helped since its inception. TLOD felt that this would be a good cause because as St. Jude states "no parent should have to worry about how to pay for their child's medical bills, they should only worry about their child getting well." This was something that TLOD could sink its teeth into since most of us were patrons of St. Jude.

Once St. Jude was contacted, they were excited to be partners with a group of African-American teenagers. They invited the TLOD National President, Lady Drema Lee Woldman; the TTA National President, Teen Gerra Gistand; the TTA Special Projects Coordinator, Lady Mavis Merritt; and the National TTA Director, Lady Janice Scimmons to tour the facility in Memphis and meet some of the children. We also participated in a PSA. It was a liberating and heart-warming occasion. TLOD signed an MOU confirming the partnership and Top Teens of America became the first multi-cultural youth group to partner with St. Jude. TLOD/TTA became one of the many community service based groups – Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Sigma Gamma Rho, Inc., Kappa Alpha Psi, Tau Kappa Epsilon, Delta Delta, etc. – who support St. Jude.

St. Jude hosts a Give Thanks Walk annually in September. This event is a noncompetitive 5K that is now held in 75 cities across the country. Those participating in the race are encouraged to form teams, invite family and friends, and raise money for St. Jude. One of the conditions of our partnership was that we could have our walk separate from everyone else so that our 122 chapters could all be engaged on the same day for a good cause. Thus, we chose the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of May annually for the "TTA Walk for St. Jude." The walks proved to be a time to put our creativity to the test. Not only did we raise money, we had some creative ways of doing it, and we had fun. Some walks took place in the park, some at the stadium track, some had after parties, barbeques, some chapters dressed in chapter and/or flamboyant attire. The walk truly gave way to caring and sharing with friends and family for a good cause.

Under our partnership agreement, TLOD/TTA agreed to raise \$30,000 annually. Over the 4 year period, TLOD/TTA raised approximately \$140,000.00. TLOD/TTA met and exceeded their goal.

St. Jude proved to be an excellent partner. They sent representatives to make presentations at the Area and National Conferences, they hosted representatives from TLOD/TTA twice, all at no cost to TLOD. They set up an online TTA Walk for St. Jude presence and held training sessions so that the coordinators would be able to assist in the online campaign. They presented plaques and certificates to the top three fund raising chapters annually and supported TLOD/TTA every step of the way with the "TTA Walk for St. Jude." They were very hands-on and showed their appreciation for our support.

At the 2019 Syn-Lod in Atlanta, TLOD voted unanimously to make St. Jude Children's Research Hospital a permanent partnership.



The Sickle Cell Disease Association of America, Inc. (SCDAA) is a nonprofit organization with the sole purpose of supporting research, education and funding of individuals, families, and those who are impacted by sickle cell disease. Their mission is to advocate for and enhance the ability to improve the quality of health, life and services for individuals, families and communities affected by sickle cell disease and related conditions, while promoting the search for a cure for all people in the world with sickle cell disease.

Under the 10<sup>th</sup> National President, Lady Peggy Lewis LeCompte, she chose to advocate Sickle Cell Disease and it became a National Project. Under the "Investing" Administration, an MOU was signed with SCDAA to partner with the National organization for the next four years to address issues on a global level and participate on the National stage. Lady Teresa Norton, National Sickle Cell Chair, was appointed to the SCDAA Board and was a guest at the National Conventions where she presented abstracts. We participated in the National Sickle Cell Walk with the Stars and raised thousands of dollars. TLOD also sponsored a booth at the Conferences.

TLOD provided leadership to Chapters through conference calls, one-on-one consultations, follow-up, coaching, and group and individual emails. We participated in monthly conference calls with SCDAA to build a partnership that specifically addresses the needs of patients and created a strategy for a joint Clinical Trial Awareness Campaign. We solicited local medical experts, and executive leaders in the Sickle Cell Community to provide professional information as well as opportunities to interact with patients. Members of TLOD are Board members of local Sickle Cell Associations, and volunteer for administrative functions at local Sickle Cell offices.

TLOD collaborated with local Sickle Cell Agencies, local physicians and politicians, churches, local blood centers, local Children's Hospitals, Howard University, Jackson Memorial Diagnostic Treatment Center, The American Red Cross, Sororities, Fraternities, Urban League, New York Life, St Louis Sickle Cell Stroll, Miami Dolphins, University of Miami, Tiki Barber, and Vanderbilt Medical Center to increase awareness and support families with Sickle Cell.

TLOD Chapters created awareness by educating the public and passing out literature, water, juice, and fruit to more than 7000 attendees at various community events throughout the year. Each chapter has volunteered at support group meetings for Sickle Cell patients.

TLOD worked in conjunction with SCDAA and representatives from Pfizer Pharmaceutical to secure funding for Sickle Cell Research and clinical trials.

Over the years, TLOD has worked diligently to spotlight Sickle Cell Disease. During this administration, each Area sought out a Sickle Cell Ambassador (a youth with sickle cell disease), and the Ambassador advocated for Sickle Cell at each conference with testimony of personal experiences. Putting a face on the Disease is powerful. Even though we do our best, there is still much work to do.

In addition to consulting with SCDAA, TLOD Chapters, and Sickle Cell families provided verbal feedback and completed surveys to ensure that all activities and programs were relevant and met the needs of Sickle Cell families.
